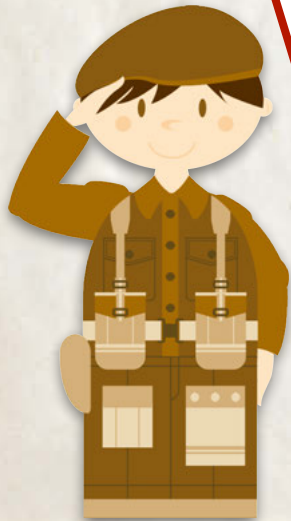


# VE Day Morse Code Challenge

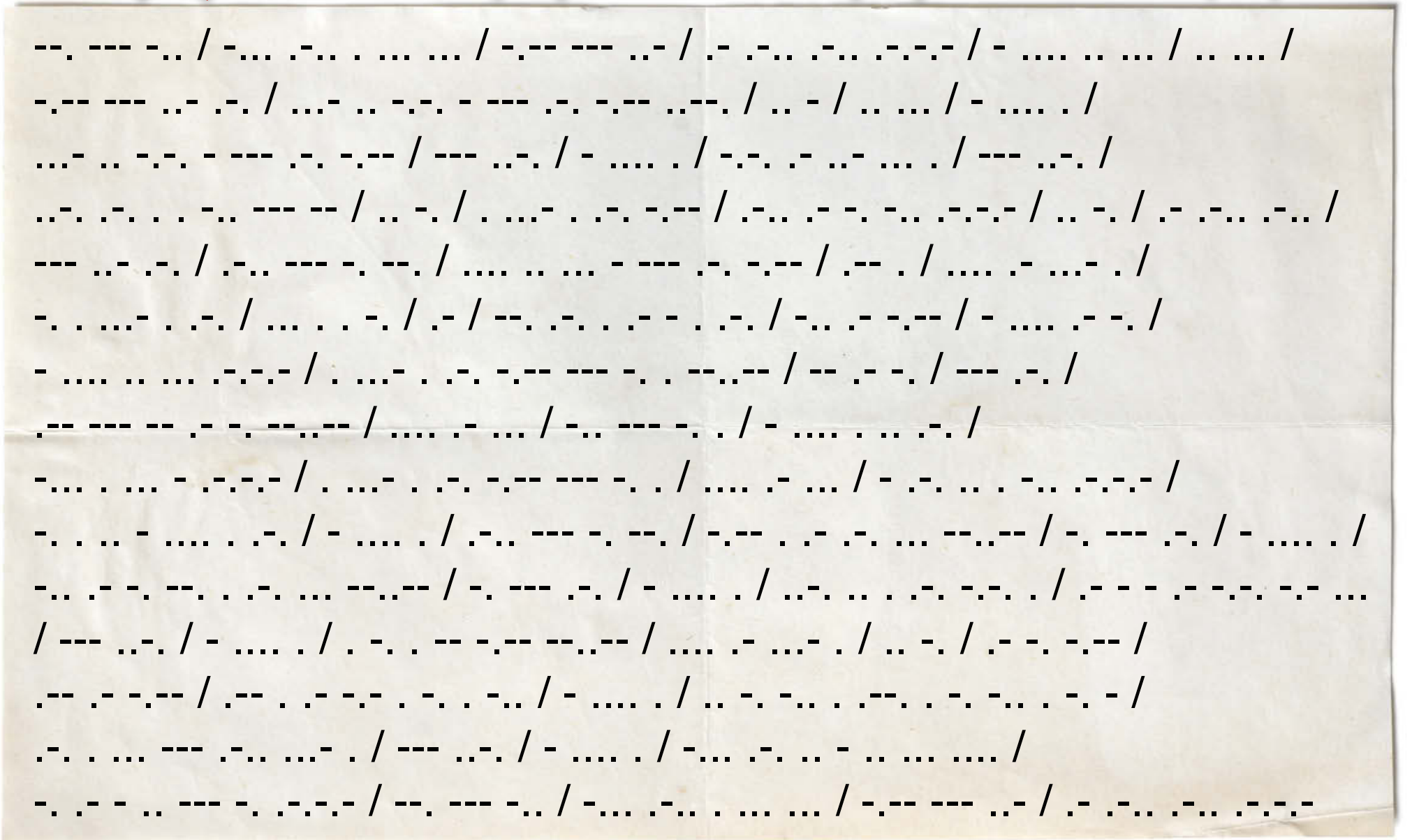
Your challenge is to use the morse code chart to decipher part of Churchill's famous speech!
